Operating Budget

- ☐ Operating budget of \$34,322,100
- 2.25% increase in general taxes and rates on the average residential tax bill
- ☐ Infrastructure Fund contribution: \$0.0105 per \$100 of assessment (residential property)
- ☐ Overall increase in the average residential tax bill of 3.25%, below the CPI*
- ☐ Use of remainder of Quebec government financial assistance for COVID-19

Operating Budget

- ☐ Optimized operations to continue to provide highquality services to residents
- ☐ Main projects for 2022:
 - Access to and use of the Grand Coteau Forest
 - Urban forest master plan
 - Plan to fight and adapt to climate change
 - Ongoing emerald ash borer action plan

Highlights (cont'd)

Operating Budget

□ Infrastructure taxes

- Introduced in 2020 following a consultation with citizens
- Purpose: Create a fund for the investments required to maintain and strengthen our infrastructure
- 2022 increase equivalent to 1% on the average residential tax bill
- Increase to be revised upward in the coming years to meet investment needs

Operating Budget

☐ COVID-19 government assistance

- In 2020, the Quebec government announced it would allocate financial assistance to municipalities in response to COVID-19 in order to mitigate the repercussions of the pandemic on municipal finances
- Total assistance of \$1,478,400 received by the Town of Rosemere
- Some of these funds have been applied to offset the direct financial impacts on the Town; to a greater extent, they have gone toward easing the fiscal burden caused by the pandemic, especially for local businesses that have been particularly hard hit



Highlights (cont'd)

3-Year Capital Investment Program

- Investment of \$21.7 million in 2022
- Main projects:
 - Redevelopment of the Charbonneau Park shoreline
 - Acquisition of lands with high ecological potential
 - \$13.6 million to strengthen, maintain and replace infrastructure
- 57% of investments planned for 2022 will be funded by third parties or grants
- \$67.6 million capital investment program for 2022-2023-2024




Increase in General Property Tax and charges vs CPI Since 2018


2022 Tax base and tax revenues


Property Tax Revenue* 2017–2022 by sector





Breakdown of 2022 Operating Revenue




Breakdown of 2022 Operating Expenses



The average homeowner in Rosemère paid, on average, 10% less in taxes and charges in 2021 than the average home in neighboring towns.
